


On January 23, 1771, during Alexander Hamilton's tenure (as a 15-year-old import-export clerk for New York traders Messrs. Kortright & Cruger. St. Croix office), his firm ran a 300 SLAVE AUCTION notice atop the front page of the local bilingual paper, *The Royal Danish American Gazette*. In the next year, his employer, Nicholas Cruger, imported 250 more slaves from Africa's Gold Coast and complained that they were "very indifferent indeed, sickly and thin." 

He joy produced by the fucceties of the Russian arms against the Turks, has on a sudden been eclipsed by a cloud that oversight the transactions of the Imperial palace with impenetrable darkness. Nothing yet has passed to the publick but a vagrant and confused report of something designed, and something discovered. Nothing is pretended to be certainly known, but that in the night of the 4th of October, the counters Czernikos and the counters D'Algarotti were each seized at mid-4th of October, the counters Czernikoń and the countefs D'Algarotti were each feized at midnight, in their own apartments, and carried prifoners to different forurefles, where none are permitted to know their fate. On the next morning feveral of the ladies attending on the perfoot of the Emprels were ordered to retire from the court, and confine themselves either at their own ing feveral of the ladies attending on the person of the Empress were ordered to retire from the court, and consine themselves either at their own houses in distant parts of the empire, or in different towns named by her Imperial Majesty. Such a fudden revolution in the fortune of many principal families has given rise to very different conjectures and reports. Some hold that a very dangerous correspondence has been intercepted between the counters D'Algarotti and the King of Prussia, while others no less considently affert that it happened between her and Prince Heraclius. Some whisper that the Swedes had formed a design to seize the Empress, and enforce the resituation of Livonia and Finland. However this be, the guards have been changed, and the regiments which for some time past have done duty at the palace, are destined to garrison the forts on the frontiers of China. Some declare openly that the counters Czernikoff having received the knout, has confessed that she had been privy to propositions for deposing the Empress. Others add still a blacker crime, that she had treated for a reward to poison her. But since whatever the counters had confessed or denied was said to particular commissioners, with every precaution of secrecy, it is apparent that these reports can be considered as nothing more than such guesses as curiosity and ignorance will always produce. But as no man knows the erime of those who are now in custody, so no man knows what may in a sew days be charged upon himself; and a general dejection and disaways in the surface of the secretary of the people for their Imperial Mistress is pourtrayed in the universal folicitude that clouds every face, where the reports of her danger has been heard. It is hoped, however, by those who judge most coolly, that the utmost crime of the ladies has been only the discovery of some secrets of state, and that none of them have been so stagistically corrupt, as to attempt the facred person of their sovereign.
