## PREFACE.

—:0:—



THE accuracy of the present volume, which contains upwards of *fifty thousand facts*, is ensured from the circumstance that the whole of the details have been compiled from particulars courteously furnished by all the noblemen and gentlemen,—with only twenty six exceptions,—who are referred to within its pages. In a work, in which there appears nearly forty thousand proper names and dates, occasional mistakes are unavoidable. These, however, arise not from want of editorial care, but from the very illegible manner in which much of the information is supplied. Indeed, in several instances where the proofs were altered, the corrections could not be deciphered by the most able expert.

In the division devoted to Counties, Boroughs, &c., returning Members to Parliament, the official declarations of the poll are given, together with the names of the unsuccessful candidates. And, to enable a comparison to be made between the present number of Registered Electors and that under the old act, the two numbers are given side by side. The correctness of these figures may be relied upon by reason of their having been kindly supplied by the Town Clerks of the various constituencies. The names of Returning Officers are now added for the first time, a feature that will be appreciated by persons who wish to correspond with those officials. In this portion of the

volume considerable space is now, and has heretofore been, occupied by engravings representing the heraldic insignia used by corporations. These illustrations I propose to omit in the next issue, and to utilise the space by supplying county and municipal information that will be generally useful for reference. To retain the engravings, while adding to the text, would necessitate an increase in the cost of the book, a circumstance that might lessen its present popularity. That the new feature may be efficiently carried out, I venture to ask that suggestions may be submitted to me, while promising to give mature consideration to every proposition.

The section referring to Parliamentary Technical Expressions may be relied upon in its entirety, as it has been revised by Reginald Palgrave, Esq., second assistant clerk of the House of Commons, for whose efficient aid I acknowledge my obligations with many thanks.

The List of Peers and Peeresses of the United Kingdom will be found useful, and I draw attention to the arrangement by which surnames and titles of eldest sons are incorporated in alphabetical order, a plan that materially assists the facility of easy reference.

Interspersed throughout the volume are a number of romantic and historical anecdotes relating to grants of arms or ancestral achievements. They are inserted as foot notes, and a perusal of them may serve the purpose of whiling away an hour.

Some of the armorial bearings that appear are purely assumptive, but I excuse myself for inserting them on the



plea that they are engraved, or described, from particulars furnished by the gentlemen by whom they are borne.

The Chronological Lists of the Lords High Chancellors, and of the Speakers of the House of Commons which are now added will, I believe, furnish information that is not elsewhere obtainable in such a complete form.

The Judicial portion, in which is given biographies of the Judges of the Superior Courts of Great Britain and Ireland, of the Judges of the County Courts, and of the Recorders, is not to be found elsewhere, and gives to this volume a character distinct from that of any kindred work.

All recent Parliamentary and Legal changes including the election for Southwark, Dublin University, Bridgnorth, &c., and the appointment of Lord Giffard, as a Lord of Session, are embodied in the work, or referred to under the heading of "Occurrences during Printing;" and summarised lists are given of the alterations that have occurred in the representation since the last General Election; from these it will be seen that twenty-five gentlemen have been unseated on petition, three have succeeded to peerages, two have been created peers, eight resigned, four accepted office, and eleven died, the number of vacant seats at the present date being thirteen.

To the noblemen and gentlemen who have supplied me with information I tender due thanks, and hope that in future years my exertions to supply authentic details will meet with equal consideration and attention.

Sir James Viney, K.C.B., of Taynton Manor, Gloucestershire,—of whom ultimately Viscountess Beaconsfield became heir-at-law,—and widow of the late Wyndham Lewis, Esq., M.P., of Pantgwynlais Castle, Glamorganshire. Is leader of the opposition in the House of Commons,—a D.L. and J.P. of Buckinghamshire, Hon. D.C.L. of Univ. of Oxford, Hon. LL.D. of the Univ. of Edinburgh, a Gov. of Wellington Coll., Trustee of the British Museum, Brother of the Trinity House, and author of "Vivian Grey," "Coningsby," and numerous other works of fiction. Was a Royal Commissioner of the Exhibition of 1851, Chancellor of the Exchequer from March,—when he was sworn a Privy Councillor,—till Dec. 1852, from Feb. 1858 till June 1859, and from July 1865 till Feb. 1868, and First Lord of the Treasury and Prime Minister from Feb. till Dec. 1868. A *Conservative*; "will uphold our Constitution in Church and State." In 1867 he introduced and carried the celebrated "Representation of the People Act." 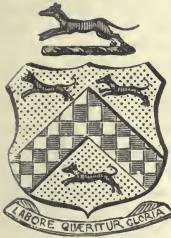

The mother, however, being afraid that her child would be reared a Protestant, ran off to the wilds of her native province with the boy, whom she brought up as a strict Catholic, and her husband appears to have been only too glad of an excuse for disowning them both, on the plea that a marriage between a Catholic and a Protestant was illegal, or at all events, voidable in law. He married a second wife, one of the daughters of the house of Ormonde, but by her he had no issue. Accordingly his son, the same who as a child had been carried off into Connaught, gained possession of the

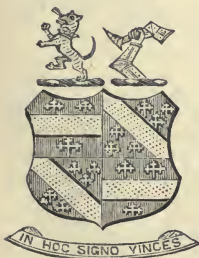

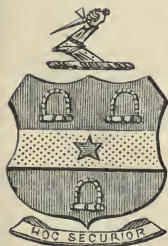

The servant showing signs of trepidation was sternly ordered by Sir William to "cut through." The man regaining his composure continued to work, and the officers of justice not having received any satisfactory information left the fugitives. The monarch, as a reward, gave the victor in addition to substantial pecuniary gifts and commemorative arms as much of the royal domain as a falcon, which was then sitting on his hand, should fly over before she alighted. The bird flew six miles and alighted on an eminence that is even now styled "Falconstone."

<sup>+</sup> The popular origin of the motto "Grip Fast" is said to be owing to Leslie, Earl of Rother, having saved Queen Margaret of Scotland from drowning, by seizing hold of her girdle when she was thrown from her horse while crossing a swollen river. She cried out "grip fast," and afterwards desired these words to be retained as her preserver's motto. A somewhat different interpretation is, however, preserved in the Leslie family. It is there stated that the founder of the family was Bartholomew, a noble Hungarian, who went to Scotland with Queen Margaret, A.D. 1067. He was much esteemed by King Malcolm Canmore, whose sister he married. In his capacity of Chamberlain to the Queen it was his duty to accompany her Majesty in her journeys, and as there were no carriages in those days, she rode behind him upon a pillion. On one occasion, while fording a stream, the Queen slipped and nearly fell off, whereon Bartholomew cried out "grip fast," to which Her Majesty replied "gin the buckle bide," there being only one buckle to the belt by which she held on. The 14th Earl, Lodovick, having been engaged on the side of King Charles 1st in the civil wars, was taken prisoner and condemned to be executed by the Parliament of Scotland, who also forfeited his title and estates in favor of John, Earl of Lindsay, Lord High Treasurer of Scotland. This nobleman, however, being doubtful of the parliamentary grant, entered into a contract with the Earl of Crawford, then in prison under sentence of death, to save him from the hands of the executioner if he would ratify the grant. The Earl of Crawford was not executed, and on his death without issue, the Earl of Lindsay succeeded him to the prejudice of the heir male.

He was born 1811, and was ed. at Winchester and at Univ. Coll., Oxford; grad. B.A., 1st class in classics and 2nd class in mathematics, 1833, M.A. 1836. Became a Fellow of Magdalen Coll. 1835, and was for several years a private tutor at Oxford. In 1836 he m. Georgiana, 2nd d. of George Orred, Esq., of Aigburth House, near Liverpool. Called to the bar at Lincoln's Inn, Jan. 1842, in which year he went to Australia. Sat as member of the Council at Sydney from 1843 till 1850, and was member for Sydney in the Colonial

\* Is descended from Sir Colin Campbell, who was summoned by Robert Bruce to Berwick, in Aug. 1291, when King Edward I. of England went there to decide the dispute between the said Bruce and John Baliol for the succession to the crown of Scotland. In 1315 he was one of the barons in the parliament of Ayr, which made an entail of the crown on King Robert and his heirs. The king subsequently gave him a grant of large estates and also his sister Margery in marriage. His son Colin, in the minority of King David Bruce, raised 400 men, and taking therewith the Castle of Dunoon, then in the possession of the English, that monarch rewarded him with the hereditary government of the same, and also an annual pension. The 1st Marquess of Argyll took much interest in the reception and coronation of Charles II., and on January 1st, 1650, placed the crown on the king's head at Scoon; but after the restoration, in 1661, he was accused by the Earl of Middleton of complying with Oliver Cromwell in the death of Charles I., for which he was condemned by parliament, and beheaded at the Market Cross of Edinburgh, May 27th, 1661. His son Archibald was restored to the honors and estates of his ancestors as Earl of Argyll, but in 1681 he was found guilty of high treason and sentenced to death. His lordship, however, dexterously escaped from prison in the dress of a lady's page, and went to Holland. In 1685 he returned to Scotland accompanied by a number of armed men, but being defeated and taken prisoner, he was executed at Edinburgh, on his former sentence, June 30th, 1685.

Parliament from 1848 till 1850, when he returned to England. Was one of the Joint Secretaries of the Board of Control from Dec. 1852 till Feb. 1855, Vice-president of the Board of Trade and Paymaster-General from Aug. 1855,—when he was created a Privy Councillor,—till March 1858, and President of the Board of Health, and Vice-president of the Educational Board of the Privy Council from June 1859 till April 1864. A *Liberal*; opposed to “all invidious distinctions and disabilities founded on religious belief.” Sat for Kidderminster from July 1852 till May 1859, and for Calne from that date till Nov. 1868, when he was first elected for London University.

+ The tradition concerning the origin of this charge is thus stated. When the ancestor of the O'Neill family was preparing, in company with several adventurers, to make a descent upon the coast of Ulster, it was unanimously decided that, whoever touched the land first, should be chief of the territory. O'Neill, finding that instead of succeeding in heading his competitors in the race for dignity, he was losing his ground, drew his sword, lopped off his left hand, and threw it on shore, as far as he was able. In this way he touched the earth first and acquired sovereign power. The water with the salmon therein naiant, alludes to the famous fisheries of Lough Neagh and the river Blackwater.

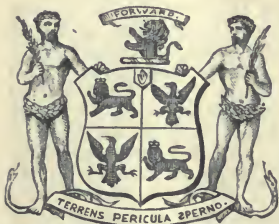

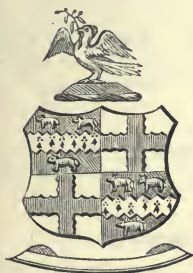

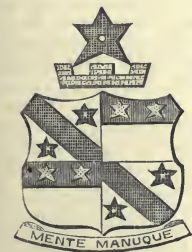

Glasgow, and in 1838 he studied organic chemistry under Liebig at Giessen, and on his

return he undertook the management of the large calico print works of Messrs. Thompson, at Clitheroe. In 1843 he was appointed Professor of Chemistry in the Royal Institution; was afterwards one of the Commissioners employed to examine into the sanitary condition of our large towns and populous districts; and on the conclusion of the commission was appointed Chemist to the Museum of Practical Geology. Was special Commissioner in charge of the Department of Juries at the Great Exhibition of 1851, and in recognition of his services was created a C.B. and received the appointment of Gentleman Usher to the late Prince Consort, which position he held for many years. At the International Exhibition of 1862 he again managed the Juries' departments and appointed the jurors. On the establishment of the department of Science and Art in 1853 he was appointed joint Secretary with Mr. Cole, and in 1858 when Mr. Cole was made Secretary, he became Inspector General of Government Museums and Schools of Science. In 1857 he was elected President of the Chemical So. of London, and in 1858 was appointed Professor of Chemistry in the Univ. of Edinburgh, which position he held until his election as M.P. in Dec. 1868. Was sent over to Ireland by the late Sir Robert Peel during the potato famine; examined for the Admiralty the coals best suited for the Navy, and for the Government into the causes of accidents in mines; was chm. of first Royal Commission for enquiring into the state of the Fisheries on the British Coasts, and was one of the Royal Commissioners appointed on the appearance of the cattle plague in this country. Holds honorary appointments as one of H.M.'s Commissioners in the Board of Manufactures, and in the Board of Fisheries for Scotland. Is a F.R.S. and Vice-Pres. or fellow of many learned and scientific societies, a C.B., Commander of the Austrian order of Francis Joseph, officer of the French Legion of Honor, Knight of the Portuguese order of The Conception, Knight of the Swedish order of the Northern Star, and a Knight of Würtemberg. *A Liberal.* Elected as the first member of the University of Edinburgh and St. Andrew's, Dec. 4th, 1868.

Was one of the Hon Secs. to the Great Exhibition of 1851. Assisted by G. Hadfield, Esq., M.P., and Sir Robert Carden, he re-constructed the policy of the board





of the South Yorkshire Railway co., and was mainly instrumental in breaking down the monopoly established by the Great Northern Railway Co. in the Coal trade on their line. Organized and led at his own cost the public opposition to the mutilation of the Thames Embankment, which proposed to direct the route into Parliament Street, so as to avoid passing the river front of the Duke of Buccleuch's mansion. An *advanced Liberal*; "in favor of the amelioration of the condition of tenant farmers; the education of the whole people; the care by the State (apart from workhouses) of orphan children; the abolition of the game laws; of great reduction in the national expenditure; and of fraternal legislation by fair means." Unsuccessfully contested Derby, July 1865; elected Nov. 1868.

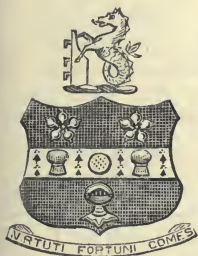

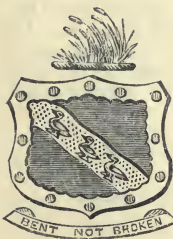

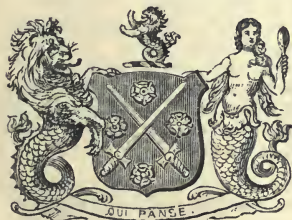

The declaration was altered in 1845 chiefly through his exertions; to enable him to omit that declaration and serve as Sheriff of London and Middlesex in 1835, the "Sheriff's Declaration Act" was passed, and he was the first Sheriff and J.P. of the Hebrew persuasion admitted to those offices in this country. Was chm. of the select Committees of the House of Commons on "Metropolitan Bridges" and on "Australian Coinage." Created a baronet, October 1869. A *Liberal*. Unsuccessfully contested Shoreham 1837, Maidstone 1841, and Greenwich 1847. Sat for Greenwich from June 1851 till July 1852, when he was an unsuccessful candidate; re-elected, Feb. and May 1859, July 1865, and Nov. 1868. 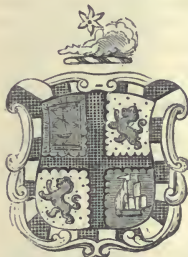

This child he directed to be laid at the foot of a tree where an eagle had built its nest, in which position he pretended that he had discovered it. His wife adopted the infant who was subsequently known as Sir Oskatell Lathom. Before Sir Thomas died, however, he revealed the fraud, and left the bulk of his property to his daughter, the wife of Sir John Stanley, whose descendants altered the Lathom crest from an eagle reguardant, to what it now is.

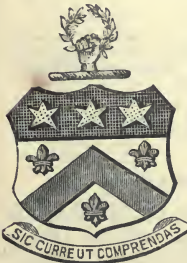

Prussian Order of the Red Eagle, Fellow of the Roy. So., and several other English and Foreign Sos. Was chm. of the So. of Arts in 1856, and President of the Roy. Asiatic So. in 1858, and of the Statistical So. of London in 1863. In 1866 he received a gold medal from the natives of Bombay for his advocacy of native education. Author of "Notes on the Religious, Moral, and Political State of Ancient India," "The Origin and Progress of the Taeping Rebellion in China," "The Organization and Cost of the English and French Armies and Navies," and of numerous papers on the Antiquities, Natural History, Meteorology, Geology, and Statistics of India and Europe. This measure, with some modifications adapting it to the special conditions of Land Tenure in Ireland, was brought before the English House of Commons in 1864 by Mr. Herbert and Mr. Monsell. Author of "First effects of Gold discovery on the currency in the Australian Colonies," "Transportation condemned as a deterrent punishment and as a means of founding colonies," and "Anomalies in the present relations between the mother country and her colonies." A *Liberal*; "considers that political connection between Church and State has in all countries tended either to corrupt the one or weaken the other. Advocates compulsory education, but would aid the voluntary efforts of denominational schools where conscience clause is observed. Holds the three great Universities to be national, not denominational institutions. In favor of the ballot, and the further disfranchisement of small boroughs." Unsuccessfully contested Cambridge, July 1865; elected for that constituency, Nov. 1868.

Introduced in 1866 and carried in 1868 the "Artizans' and Laborers' Dwellings' Bill;" and carried the Lodger Franchise in the Reform Act of 1867. Assumed in 1863 the maternal name of Torrens in addition to his patronymic. An *advanced Liberal*; "in favor of the ballot and the transfer of seats from small boroughs to populous cos. and towns. An advocate of retrenchment and of the right of asylum." Unsuccessfully contested Dundalk August 1847, but in March 1848 was seated on petition, and retained his seat until July 1852, when he was an unsuccessful candidate for Yarmouth, and sat for the last-named borough from March till December 1857. \* The tradition respecting the origin of these arms is said to have originated in the following circumstance. It is stated that several centuries ago a large tract of land on the Cornish coast between the Land's End and the Seven Stones, but which is now submerged by encroachments of the sea, belonged to an ancestor of the Trevelyan family. The submergence was very sudden; and it is related that the then owner of the land, when upon a riding excursion, found himself cut off from the main land, in a locality far removed from human habitations. Finding his position becoming momentarily more perilous, and night approaching, he determined to attempt to reach the shore with his horse by swimming. The distance was great, but his steed was strong and possessed spirit. So soon as the tide began to flow he started on his perilous journey, and at the very moment when he expected to be lost through the exhaustion of his steed the noble animal touched land, and both he and his rider were saved. In commemoration of his gratitude to the horse, he ordered that the rest of its life should be one of rest and plenty, and he assumed in lieu of his former arms those which his descendants now bear.

## THE NUMBER OF PUBLIC ACTS

Passed in the last Session was 117, against 130 in the preceding year. The local statutes numbering 182, against 159 in the previous year.

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## CONSTITUTION OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

At the time of the union with Scotland, in 1707, the House consisted of 513 members; 45 were then added for Scotland, and in 1801, 100 were added for Ireland, making the present total of 658. This total number was preserved by the first Reform Act (1832), as well as by the recent one (30 and 31 Vict. cap. 102), but in each case the appointment was altered, and it now stands, England and Wales 493 members, Scotland 60, and Ireland 105. By the Reform Act of 1867, 11 English boroughs were totally disfranchised, and 23 others lost one member each, but 25 seats were bestowed on new boroughs and universities, and 28 on counties, some receiving 1 additional member, and others being so subdivided that Yorkshire now returns 10 members, and Lancashire 8, whilst the majority of the rest have 4 or 6. Taking the three kingdoms, there are now 375 members for boroughs and universities, and 283 for counties; but up to 1867 the numbers were, boroughs and universities, 402; counties, 256.

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## EXPLANATION OF SOME TECHNICAL

## PARLIAMENTARY EXPRESSIONS AND PRACTICES,

WITH BRIEF DESCRIPTIONS OF THE

## DUTIES OF SOME OF THE HIGHER OFFICERS OF STATE.

**ACCEPTANCE OF OFFICE.** Under statute 6 Ann, c. 7, holders of offices of profit accepted from the Crown or the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, are incapacitated from a seat in Parliament, if the office be created since 1705. The acceptor of offices created prior to that year must vacate his seat and submit himself to re-election; but by the Reform Act, 1867, holders of the principal offices of state are no longer required to submit themselves to re-election, upon a transfer from one office to another. The principle established by the Statute of Ann has also been in the following manner modified and extended. The English, Scotch, and Irish judges (except the Master of the Rolls in England), Colonial Governors, officers in the Excise or Customs, and holders of pensions from the Crown, are excluded from Parliament; but ambassadors, foreign ministers, consuls, and holders of diplomatic pensions, are not excluded; and four principal, and four under Secretaries of State, the Parliamentary Secretary of the Board of Trade, and the Postmaster General are capable of election. Thirty-one holders of Government offices are seated in the present House of Commons.

**ADJOURNMENT** of its sitting is solely in the power of each House of Parliament; but if both Houses be adjourned for more than fourteen days, the Crown may by proclamation direct them to re-assemble. Adjournment by the House of Commons must be on question put and agreed to, except where there is "no House," and at six o'clock on Wednesdays. Adjournment of Debate may be moved by any member who has not spoken to the original question, at any time before the question is fully put, but it cannot be moved in Committee.

**ADMIRALTY, FIRST LORD OF THE.** Is Chief of the Commissioners appointed to discharge the office of Lord High Admiral.

**ALIENS** are not eligible to vote for the election of members of Parliament in England and Ireland, neither can they take their seat as members for any constituency. Their right to vote in Scotland is questioned.

**AMENDMENT, An,** is the mode by which the decision of the House on a question may be intercepted, by submitting for its consideration an alternative proposition either wholly or partially opposed to the original question.

**ATTORNEY-GENERAL.** A Law officer of the Crown, whose business is to exhibit informations and prosecute for the Crown in matters criminal, and institute suits in the Exchequer for anything concerning the Queen in inheritance or profit.

**AUDITOR.** (See Election Auditor.)

**AVOIDANCE OF A DECISION, An,** may be effected by proposing an Amendment to the original question, or by substitution in its stead of another question, such as the adjournment of the House, or of the debate; "the previous question;" or "that the orders of the day be now read;" or by enforcing the adjournment of the House, owing to the absence of a quorum.

**AYES.** Members voting in favor of a motion.

**BANKRUPT MEMBERS** are by statute immediately incapable of sitting. At the expiration of twelve months after a member has become a bankrupt, his election is void, and a writ will issue for the election of another representative.

**BILLS, PRIVATE.** (See Private Bills.)



**BILLS, PUBLIC.** In the House of Lords the consent of the House is not required to the introduction of a bill; in the Commons no bill can be brought in unless a motion for leave has received the assent of the House; and proposals for bills relating to religion, trade, taxation, and the grant of public money, must be moved in a Committee of the whole House. Leave given, the bill is brought in and read a first time without amendment or debate: though a division may be taken on the question. A day is then appointed for the second reading, previously to which the bill is printed and each member supplied with a copy. After being read a second time it is referred to a Committee of the whole House, when its details are considered. A member may discuss its principles at any stage, but is not considered to have declared in favor of such principles unless he has supported the second reading of the bill. In committee the bill is debated clause by clause and the blanks filled up. The chairman of the committee then reports to the House the changes that the bill has undergone. This he does by stating to the Speaker that "the committee has gone through the bill" and either "made an amendment thereto" or "has directed him to report the same without amendment." If no amendment has been made, the bill is ordered to be read a third time, on a future day; but if the committee have altered it, the bill is ordered to be considered as amended. If the amendments are considerable, it is customary to reprint the bill. On the consideration of a bill as amended, no restraint is placed upon the amendments that may be made, or on the addition of new clauses of which notice has been given. On the third reading the judgment of the House is expressed upon the entire bill, and only verbal amendments can at this stage be made. The next question is that the "bill do pass," and the last that its title be determined. During the progress of the bill the House may divide on the following questions: 1st, on the first reading; 2nd, on the second reading; 3rd, that it be committed; 4th, that the bill as amended be considered; 5th, that the bill be recommitted; 6th, that it be read a third time; 7th, that it do pass; 8th, the title of the bill. These are exclusive of the divisions that may be taken on amendments proposed to be made to the bill in committee, or on its consideration as amended. After the passing of a bill, the Clerk of the House takes it to the bar of the House of Lords, and desires its concurrence. In the Upper House it passes through similar forms to those of the Commons. If the Lords agree with the Commons in the principle of a measure, but differ on matters of detail, the bill is returned to the Commons, bearing the amendments the Lords propose: these

are considered by the Lower House, and if disagreed to, the bill is returned back to the Lords with a message assigning reasons for the disagreement. If the difference between the Houses be maintained, a conference (which see) may be held touching the amendments. Acts of amnesty are read only once in each House. Bills that have passed both Houses remain with the Lords, except those of supply, which are sent back to the Commons to be by the Speaker presented at the bar of the Lords to the Sovereign or to the Royal Commissioners. Bills respecting religion or trade cannot be introduced until the proposition has been agreed to by a Committee of the whole House.

**BOARD OF TRADE, THE.** Considers all matters especially relating to trade and the Colonies. It consists of a President, Vice-President, and several high Officers of State, though it is practically managed by a President, and Parliamentary Secretary. It has the general superintendence of all matters relating to merchant-ships, and seamen, and exercises a supervision over railways, the registration of Joint Stock Companies, &c. It also collects and publishes statistics of the revenue, trade, commerce, wealth, population, &c. of the United Kingdom and its dependencies, as well as of foreign countries.

**BOROUGH VOTERS.** The persons eligible to vote for the election of members of Parliament in boroughs are 1st, the freemen, *i. e.* those whose names were on the list immediately before the passing of the first Reform Act. None, however, can acquire the right to vote as freemen unless through birth or servitude, and no one can derive it by birth unless his predecessor held it prior to the passing of the Reform Act or had acquired it by servitude. 2nd. The holders of freeholds and burgage tenements. These are required to be in receipt of rents and profits for a year, unless when the property has come by descent or settlement, and likewise that they should reside for six months in the town or its neighbourhood. 3rd. Householders, *i. e.*, the occupants, whether as owners or tenants, who have been in sole occupation of premises for a whole year prior to the 31st of July; who during such period have been rated as ordinary occupiers, and who on or before the 20th of July shall have paid all poor-rates up to the preceding 5th day of January. 4th. Lodgers who *bond fide* occupy rooms the annual value of which unfurnished is not less than 10*l.* a year, and who have resided therein for one year prior to the 31st of July. At contested elections no person can vote for more than two candidates except in London, where votes may be given for three candidates. [See Burgess Roll and Successive Occupation.]

**BRIBERY.** Both the giver and the receiver of a bribe can be put into the witness-box and be compelled to answer any questions, however they might criminate themselves. The giver must say to whom he gave, and what he gave, and where he procured the cash. The receiver must say what he received, and from whom he received it. Any person who gives or receives a bribe is disfranchised for life, and his name is to be printed at the foot of every succeeding register of voters for that place in a distinct list, headed "disqualified for bribery, treating, or undue influence." A candidate guilty of bribery is incompetent to be elected to a seat in Parliament for seven years. He is liable to a penalty of 100*l.* to any person who will sue for it. He is liable to indictment for a misdemeanour, and to be punished with fine and imprisonment. He is incompetent to vote at any Parliamentary or municipal election; he cannot hold any municipal or judicial office; and, if a magistrate, is to be removed from the commission of the peace. The terms "bribery," "treating," and "undue influence," are very clearly defined, and little is left for the ingenuity of venal voters, who will find it difficult to evade the law where a disposition exists to punish them. Candidates and their agents are strictly prohibited from providing cockades or ribbons, or any other mark of distinction, and any person so giving or providing is liable to a penalty of 40*s.* Any payment made for bands of music, or for flags or banners, will be deemed an illegal payment, the fine of 40*s.* to go to the person who shall sue for it. Refreshments to voters are also illegal; the words in the act run thus:—"And whereas doubts have also arisen as to whether the giving of refreshments to voters on the day of nomination or day of polling be or be not according to law, and it is expedient that such doubts should be removed: be it declared and enacted, that the giving or causing to be given to any voter on the day of nomination or day of polling, on account of such voter having polled or being about to poll, any meat, drink, or entertainment by way of refreshment, or any money or ticket to enable such voter to obtain refreshment, shall be deemed an illegal act, and the person so offending shall forfeit the sum of 40*s.* for each offence to any person who shall sue for the same, together with full costs of suit, and if any candidate, or any person on his behalf, shall pay any money on account of the conveyance of any voter to the poll, such payment shall be deemed to be an illegal payment within the Corrupt Practices Act, 1864."

**BUDGET, THE.** Is the financial statement laid annually by the Chancellor of the Exchequer before Parliament of the estimated public income and expenditure

of the following year, commencing on the 5th of April. In it he mentions what taxes it is proposed to repeal, to reduce, or augment, and what new ones are to be imposed. In his speech on this occasion the Chancellor reviews the financial condition of the country, comparing the income and expenditure of the previous year with those of preceding years, justifying the changes that are proposed to be made, and estimating their probable effects.

**BURGAGE TENANTS.** Are those who are inhabitants of boroughs, and who by custom hold their lands or tenements of the Queen, or other person, by a rent certain. By the operation of the Enfranchisement Act these persons are rapidly diminishing.

**BURGESS.** Is a person whose name appears upon the Burgess Roll of Parliamentary Boroughs. It is also the technical term applied to a borough member.

**BURGESS ROLL.** Is a list kept in each borough of persons who are entitled to vote for the election of Members to Parliament. Each burgess must be a male of full age, not an alien, and not have received parochial relief during the previous twelve months, or alms, or pension, or charitable allowance from the charitable trustees of the borough.

**CABINET, THE.** Is formed of the highest Officers of State, and always includes the First Lord of the Treasury, the Lord Chancellor, the Lord President of the Council, the Lord Privy Seal, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, and the Secretaries of State. It also always includes three, but never more than eight, members, selected from the following functionaries:—Commissioner of Works and Buildings, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, First Lord of the Admiralty, President of the Board of Trade, Master of the Mint, Judge Advocate-General, Postmaster-General, Chief Secretary for Ireland, and President of the Poor Law Board. [See Ministry.]

**CALL, THE, OF THE HOUSES.** When urgent business is anticipated, it has been the practice of both Houses to appoint a day, when the names of the members are called over in a prescribed order, and those who are not then present are subject to censure or punishment from the House. This practice, however, has fallen into disuse.

**CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS.** This officer is elected by the House in Committee on Supply on the assembling of a new Parliament. He presides whenever the House is in Committee,

and sits at the table in the seat of the Clerk of the House. His vote is never given in Committee, except when, on a division, the numbers are equal. In the absence of the Speaker, he presides as that official's deputy, but is only appointed from day to day. He has also the superintendence of the procedure and practice prescribed for private bills.

**CHANCELLOR OF THE DUCHY OF LANCASTER.** Is an officer appointed chiefly to determine controversies between the Queen and her tenants of the Duchy of Lancaster.

**CHANCELLOR OF THE EXCHEQUER, THE.** Is the principal Finance Minister of the Crown, and exercises the chief and most responsible control over the expenditure of different branches of the public revenue, the details of which are annually submitted for revision. [See Budget.]

**CHANCELLOR, THE LORD.** Is created by the will of the Sovereign, by the mere act of delivering the Great Seal into his custody; he holds office during the pleasure of the Crown, but practically resigns office with his party. He is Speaker of the House of Lords, and by virtue of his office a Member of the Privy Council. He issues writs for summoning Parliament, and transacts all business connected with the custody of the Great Seal. He is principal adviser to the Crown in matters of Law, Chief Judge of the Court of Chancery, and head of the profession of the law. He appoints nearly all the judges of the superior courts, the judges of county courts, and all justices of the peace, and is patron of all Crown livings rated under £20. He is visitor in right of the Crown of all hospitals and colleges of Royal foundation; has the general guardianship of all infants, idiots, and lunatics; and exercises a special jurisdiction in questions relating to charities and trust estates. He ranks above all Dukes not of the blood Royal, and next to the Archbishop of Canterbury.

**CHILTERN HUNDREDS.** They comprise a range of chalky hills traversing the county of Bucks, between Tring, in Hertfordshire, and Goring, in Warwickshire. Their principal summit is Wendover, which is about 900 feet above the level of the sea. The office of "The Stewards of the Chiltern Hundreds" was established for the purpose of suppressing bands of depredators, who in former times infested the forests with which the sides of these hills were covered, and it has been retained to enable members of the House of Commons to resign their seats in assembly by accepting office under the Crown. The duties of steward are

nominal, and there is no pay attached to the position. The appointment is vested in the Chancellor of the Exchequer.

**CITY VOTERS.** [See Borough Voters.]

**CLERK OF THE HOUSE.** Is appointed by letters patent. He sits at the upper end of the table, with two assistants. His duty is to record the decisions of the House, i.e., to make minutes of its votes, divisions, and all other proceedings, and to see that they are correctly printed and distributed to the members. He also reads aloud such documents as the House may order to be read, and performs the office of President on the election of a Speaker. The appointment of the Clerks in the service of the House is vested in this officer.

**COLONIES, SECRETARY OF STATE FOR THE,** has under his control all matters connected with the government of our extensive Colonial possessions.

**COMMISSIONERS.** The technical name applied to the representatives of Scottish counties and boroughs.

**COMMITTALS.** The House of Commons has the power to repress any aggression committed upon its privileges, and it can order into custody any person so offending. Such imprisonment, however, expires at the end of the session.

**COMMITTEE OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS, THE,** examine the public accounts which show the appropriation of sums granted annually by Parliament to meet the public expenditure. It consists of nine members who are appointed at the commencement of each session.

**COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC PETITIONS, THE,** reports throughout the session a classified list of the petitions presented to the House; and scrutinises them for the purpose of seeing whether or not they are in order.

**COMMITTEES.** Those of the whole House are generally for the purpose of considering certain resolutions, or the details of a bill; or for financial purposes, such as those of "Supply" or "Ways and Means." Select Committees are for specific purposes, the numbers composing which, as a rule, consist of fifteen members. Presence of strangers is generally permitted by Commons' Committees while witnesses are under examination, but not while the Committee deliberates. Members are entitled to be present throughout Committee sittings, unless the



House otherwise orders, or unless it be a Select Committee. The consideration of private bills is referred to Committees consisting of four members. All proceedings of Committees must cease when the Sergeant-at-Arms announces that "the House is going to prayers," and any business transacted after such notice is null and void, unless such committees be empowered to sit after prayers. When the whole House goes into Committee the Speaker vacates the chair, the mace is placed under the table, and the Chairman of Ways and Means, or in his absence a member of the House, is called on to preside.

**CONFERENCE, A,** is the meeting of a delegated number of Peers and of members of the Commons' House to communicate a written message upon matters in which it is desirable that the two Houses should co-operate. At a "free conference" the subject of the written message may be taken into debate. Conferences are now rarely necessary, as the Houses receive messages transmitted by their clerks; and only one "free conference" has been held during the last 120 years.

**CONTROVERTED ELECTIONS.** The trial of election petitions is now regulated by a new statute, which transfers the entire jurisdiction to the Courts of Law. A petition must be signed by all the petitioners, and must be presented within 21 days after the return of the writ, unless it questions the return on an allegation of corrupt practices, &c., in which case it may be presented at any time within 28 days after the day of payment. It will thus be seen that the hitherto not infrequent practice of promising at the election and paying after the time had elapsed for the presentation of a petition is met by permission being given to petition between 28 days after the payment of the bribe, whensoever made. At the time of presentation of a petition, or within three days after, security for 1,000*l.* is to be given by those who present it for payment of all costs, charges, and expenses that may become payable by the petitioner.

**COUNT OUT.** If a member moves that "the House be counted," and forty Members be not present, the Speaker adjourns the House with one question put, till next sitting-day. [See "No House."]

**COUNTY VOTERS.** The persons entitled to vote for the election of members of Parliament in counties are, 1st. Those who were in possession of life freeholds at the time of the passing of the first Reform Act retain the franchise. 2nd. The possessors of land on any title not freehold—such as copyhold or on a lease for sixty years—or tene-

ments of freehold, copyhold, or other tenure for his own life or the life of another, or for any lives whatever, or for any estate the clear value of which is not less than 5*l.*, and the lessees of property, the original lease of which was not less than 60 years. 3rd. Tenants and occupants of lands or premises, the annual rental of which is not less than 12*l.*, and who have been occupiers for not less than a year ending July 31st, and who have on the 20th of that month paid poor rates up to the previous 5th day of January. No one can hold a county vote on the freehold of a tenement which would give him a right to vote in a town, whether he exercises that right or not; and no one can vote for a county for property other than freehold, if it give the right of voting in a town. And at a contested election no person can vote for more than two candidates. [See Joint Occupiers and Successive Occupation.]

**COURTS OF REVISION.** [See Registration of Voters and Revising Barrister.]

**CRIMINAL MEMBERS.** [See Expulsion of Members.]

**DAY SITTINGS.** [See Morning Sittings.]

**DEPUTY-SPEAKER.** [See Chairman of Committee on Ways and Means.]

**DISFRANCHISE.** Is the act of taking away the privilege of the franchise.

**DISQUALIFIED TO VOTE.** Peers of the Realm and persons whose names do not appear upon the Register of Voters—persons under twenty-one years of age—persons not of sound mind—persons who have been convicted of bribery or perjury—persons connected with the Metropolitan Police Force,—those who within the last twelve months have received any parochial relief, or who during the previous six months have been retained or employed for the purposes of any Parliamentary Election for reward.

**DISSOLUTION.** Is the civil death of the Parliament, and may be effected by the pleasure of the Crown, or by length of time (seven years). It puts an end to the representative character of the members, and a Parliament cannot be assembled until after a general election.

**DIVISION, A.** Is the mode of taking the votes of each House of Parliament. When a division is demanded in the Commons, the Clerk turns a two-minute sand-glass, and the doors of the House are not closed till it has run down. The Speaker then directs that the doors be locked; he puts the question, the voices are given, and he

directs the "ayes" and the "noes" to go into the right and left lobbies. Whilst passing through the lobbies, the clerks record the names of those present and the tellers count the numbers. The tellers then return to the House, and report the numbers, which is finally announced by the Speaker.

**DOUBLE ELECTION.** Members returned during a recess by two constituencies must within seven days after the expiration of the time limited for the presentation of petitions against the returns, elect for which they will serve.

**DOUBLE RETURN.** Two members returned for one seat are directed by the Speaker to withdraw below the bar as soon as they have taken the oath; nor can they vote till the return has been adjudicated upon.

**DROPPED ORDERS OF THE DAY.** Are the bills or orders which were not considered owing to an adjournment of the House. They are set down on the paper for the next sitting-day.

**ELECTION AUDITOR.** Is an officer appointed annually, whose duty it is to take and publish an account of all expenses incurred at elections. Any payment made in respect of an election otherwise than through this official is declared to be illegal. [See Returning Officer's expenses.]

#### **ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT.**

When a New Parliament is to be summoned the Lord Chancellor receives a written command from the Sovereign in Council to that effect, and directs the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery to issue writs to the returning officer of each electoral district. The returning officer of each county must, within two days of the receipt of the writ, cause proclamation to be made of the time and place of the said election, which must not be later than the twelfth nor sooner than the fourth day after such proclamation. In boroughs, the officer must proceed with the election within six days after the receipt of the writ, having first given three clear days' notice. On the day fixed for the election the writ is publicly read by the returning officer, and candidates are proposed and seconded by qualified electors. A show of hands is then taken of those present, and the officer declares the apparent result without knowing whether those present, and who have held up their hands, are voters or the contrary. If the parties are satisfied with this declaration, the election is at an end. If, however, the parties or any candidate are dissatisfied,

they demand a poll, and the return is not made till this is over. In a contested election polling-rooms are engaged and booths are erected in various convenient localities. Each of these is presided over by a deputy, and the votes are recorded by poll-clerks. The polling is commenced and carried on simultaneously at all the rooms and booths. It commences at 8 a.m. and closes at 4 p.m. in boroughs, and 5 p.m. in counties. In boroughs the polling must take place on the day following that fixed for the elections, and in counties the next day but two. On the day succeeding that on which the poll has been taken, the returning officer declares, not later than 2 p.m., the state of the poll, and makes proclamation of the member or members chosen. The officer then returns the writ, with the name or names of the person or persons elected, to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, to whom also the poll-books are delivered. Immediately after the declaration of the poll an elected candidate is considered to be a Member of Parliament, but cannot act as a legislator until he has taken the oaths. If any military be stationed in a place where an election is taking place, they are obliged to be withdrawn until the proceedings have closed.

**ELECTION PETITIONS.** [See Controverted Elections.]

**ESCHEATORSHIP OF MUNSTER.** Is a nominal office under the Crown, by acceptance of which a member vacates his seat.

**ESTATE OF THE REALM.** The three estates of the realm are the three branches of the legislature,—the Lords spiritual, the Lords temporal, and the Commons. The Sovereign, Lords, and Commons, in their united character, exercise none but legislative functions. The three are the Parliament, but no bill can become law unless all concur in it. In addition, each has separate functions peculiar to itself. In the Sovereign the whole executive authority is vested. The House of Lords exercises judicial authority as a court of *dernier ressort*, and is a tribunal to which great officers of State, impeached by the Lower House, are amenable. The House of Commons is endowed with the sole control of the national expenditure, and with the levy of taxation to provide for that expenditure.

**EXECUTIVE.** [See Ministry and also Cabinet.]

**EXPULSION OF MEMBERS** for grave offences is a power possessed by the House of Commons. It has been exercised from time to time to free Parliament from the

presence of discreditable members, such as men found guilty of forgery, perjury, &c. The last occasion, February, 1857, was that of James Sadleir, expelled for flight from justice.

**FINANCE.** The financial concerns of the State devolve upon the Chancellor of the Exchequer.

**FOREIGN SECRETARY OF STATE, THE.** Has the exclusive charge of the interests of the British Empire and British subjects in foreign countries. He negotiates all treaties, leagues, and alliances with foreign states, either directly with the Foreign Minister at this Court, or through the British Ambassador abroad; and is the official organ and responsible adviser to the Crown in all communications between his Government and foreign powers.

**FORMS OF PROCEDURE.** The proceedings of the Commons are regulated by standing orders, the permanent bye-laws of the House, by sessional orders renewed annually, and by the custom of Parliament, embodied in rules and regulations established by usage, or laid down in the journals. The following is an outline of parliamentary practice:—No motion for the grant of public money may be presently entered upon: but must be put to the vote on a future day. Notice, as a rule, must be given of every motion that is proposed for discussion, and, except in committee, it must be seconded. There must never be more than one question before the House at the same time. However many amendments may be proposed upon a motion each one is separately disposed of. If there be a majority for any words standing part of a question to be put to the House, then a vote of yea or nay is taken on the question with these words in it. If the amendments are all lost by negatives to their being part of the question, then the original proposal, whatever it may be, motion or bill, is stripped of all the counter proposals and variations which the debate has called forth, and a vote of yea or nay can be taken on it. No member can thus be driven to vote for what he does not approve; for after having voted in favor of such amendments as he may propose to the original question, he can vote against it in the end. No question or bill may be offered upon which a judgment has been expressed during the current session; nor may even a phrase in a question adopted by a vote of either House be afterwards subjected to even a verbal alteration. A bill that has passed both Houses contains all the sentences and all the words to be found in the Act of Parliament to which the Royal

assent is given. When a member speaks it must be to some question before the House, or his speech may introduce a question. The mover of a substantive motion is permitted a reply at the conclusion of the debate, and those who have spoken to the original question may speak again when an amendment or a new question, such as the adjournment of the debate, has been proposed; but otherwise no one is entitled to more than one opportunity of speaking on a question, except when the House is in Committee. No member may call another by his name; if it is desired to call personal attention to him he must be individualized by the place he represents. Any member may interrupt another by "rising to order," i. e., calling the attention of the chair to the fact that a breach of order was then being committed. It is out of order for a member to refer to debates in the House of Lords. No Bill is converted into a Law unless it has received three readings—that is, has been at three stated intervals brought under consideration in each House, has passed each House after the three readings, and has received the Royal assent. All bills which affect taxes or duties to the most trifling amount, can only begin with the Commons. Bills for restitution of honors and in blood always begin in the Peers. A member who moves the adjournment of a debate is by courtesy entitled to speak first when the debate is resumed. But this rule does not apply to the renewal of debate in a Committee of the whole House. For the sake of convenience, certain parties—ministerial, opposition, or otherwise—group themselves on benches which they appropriate to themselves. When two or more members rise simultaneously to address the House the Speaker or Chairman signifies who shall have precedence. It is irregular to refer to the opinions of the Sovereign to influence a decision of the House.

**FRANCHISE.** In law, is defined as "a Royal privilege, or a branch of the Queen's prerogative subsisting in the hands of a subject." As applied to Parliament the term means the right to vote at an election for a member of Parliament. [See County Voters and also Borough Voters.]

**FRANCHISES.** [See Borough Voters and County Voters.]

**FREEMEN.** Are persons who have been admitted to the freedom of a corporate town, or of any other corporate body.

**FREEMAN'S ROLL.** Is a list of all persons admitted burgesses or freemen, who were entitled to a share or benefit of the lands



and public stock of the borough before the passing of the Municipal Corporations Act, 16 and 17 Vict., c. 76.

**GOVERNMENT ORDERS.** The bills brought in by the Government, and which they are entitled to place at the head of the list of orders of the day on Mondays, Thursdays, and Fridays.

**HOME DEPARTMENT, SECRETARY OF STATE FOR.** The duties and responsibilities of this high officer comprehend the maintenance of the internal peace of the United Kingdom, the security of the laws, and the general supervision of matters relating to the administration of criminal justice.

**HOUSE OF COMMONS.** According to the theory of the English constitution, the House of Commons represents the whole population. Although the knights or the members returned by the freeholders of the county are presumed to represent the interest concerned in agriculture; and burgesses, or members returned by towns, have their attention most directed towards the interests of trade; yet it is unconstitutional to suppose that members are delegates of any special community. Each member is held to represent the interests of the nation. [See "Estate of the Realm."]

**INDIA, THE SECRETARY OF STATE FOR.** Has the control of all matters connected with our Indian Empire.

**INSTRUCTION, AN.** Empowers a Committee of the whole House to consider matters not otherwise referred to them, and restricts or extends the order of reference to a Select Committee.

**JOINT OCCUPIERS.** In a county where premises are in the joint occupation of several persons as owners and servants, two persons may be registered in respect to such premises providing the clear value of such premises is in excess of £10 a year.

**KNIGHT OF THE SHIRE.** The designation by which the representative of a county or shire is distinguished from the representative of a borough, town, or any city or town which is a county in itself. At the conclusion of an election, when the state of the poll is declared by the High Sheriff of the county, that functionary causes each newly-elected member to be girt with a sword, and spurs to be buckled on his feet, in token of his election as a Knight of the Shire.

**LA REYNE LE VEULT.** The words in which the Queen gives her Royal assent to public general bills.

**LA REYNE REMERCIE SES BONS SUJETS, ACCPETE LEUR BENEVOLENCE, ET AINSI LE VEULT.** The words in which the Queen gives the Royal assent to a bill of supply.

**LA REYNE S'AVISERA.** The words in which the Queen might refuse the Royal assent to a bill.

**LEAVE OF ABSENCE** from the service of the House is granted to members for a specified time, on reasonable cause assigned.

**LES PRELATS, SEIGNEURS, ET COMMUNES, EN CE PRESENT PARLEMENT ASSEMBLÉES AU NOM DE TOUTS VOUS AUTRES SUJETS REMERCIENT TRES HUMBLEMENT VOSTRE MAJESTÉ, ET PRIENT À DIEU VOUS DONNER EN SANTÉ BONNE VIE ET LONGUE.** The phrase adopted to express to Her Majesty the gratitude of her subjects for having given her assent to the bills of grace or amnesty that have originated with the Crown.

**LETTERS** addressed to members at the House of Commons are kept by a clerk from the General Post Office, who attends from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m., and delivers them only to the members personally, or to their authorised representatives. All letters or communications directed to the House are opened by the Speaker.

**LODGER FRANCHISE.** Every person claiming to be placed on the register of voters must make his claim to the overseers of his parish between the 1st and 25th day of August. [See Borough Voters.]

**LORD ADVOCATE, THE.** Is the principal Law Officer of the Crown in Scotland. He pleads in all cases that concern the Crown, acts as public prosecutor, and superintends the general administration of criminal justice. He also undertakes in Parliament the charge of all bills that relate to Scotland.

**LORD PRIVY SEAL, THE.** Has the custody of the Privy Seal, which he must not put to any grant without good warrant under the monarch's signet. The seal is used to all charters, grants, and pardons signed by the Sovereign before they come to the Great Seal. He is appointed by letters patent, and takes rank next to the Lord President of the Council, and before all Dukes.

**MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT** are under a constitutional obligation to attend the service of the House; and the House is empowered to punish neglect of this duty by committal to custody. The service on Committees may be enforced in like manner. Having secured a seat at prayers, a member is entitled to retain the same until the rising of the House, but he may not affix his name to any seat before the hour of prayer.

**MINISTRY, THE.** Is a Committee of the leading members of both Houses of Parliament. It is nominated by the Crown, but consists exclusively of statesmen whose opinions on the pressing questions of the time agree in the main with the majority of the members of the House of Commons. Some eminent party-leader, who has the confidence of the majority of the House of Commons, is authorized by the Sovereign to form a Ministry, the members of which he selects from his party, or from those favorable to his policy, he himself being the Prime Minister, and taking commonly the office of First Lord of the Treasury. It is indispensable that those Ministers who are not Peers should be members of Parliament. The Ministry exercises supreme authority, and include the executive, the legislative, and the judicial powers, and in it for the time being the whole of the Royal power is vested. The members are all Privy Counsellors, and being more immediately responsible for the conduct of public affairs, their deliberations are always considered confidential, and kept secret, even from their colleagues who are less exalted in office. Indeed, no record whatever is kept of its resolutions or meetings, nor has its existence ever been recognised by Act of Parliament. [See Cabinet.]

**MORNING SITTING.** Whenever the House meets for business before two o'clock p.m. (except on Wednesdays and Saturdays), unless the House shall otherwise order, the Speaker adjourns the sitting at ten minutes to four o'clock until six o'clock, at which time any business undisposed of before four o'clock is taken after the orders of the day; but from two o'clock till seven are the customary hours for morning sittings.

**MOTION, A.** The offer of a substantive proposition for adoption by the House, such

as a motion for leave to bring in a bill, or of a resolution expressive of an abstract opinion. [See also Notices of Motion.]

**NAMED.** For a member to be named by the Speaker is a signification that he has incurred the displeasure of the House.

**NOES.** Members voting against a motion.

**No HOUSE.** There is "no House" if official notice be taken that forty members are not present, except when the Commons are summoned by the Sovereign or the Royal Commissioners to attend at the bar of the House of Lords, when any number of members constitutes a House. [See "Count out."]

**NOTICES OF MOTION.** The notice of an intended motion must as a rule appear on the business paper of the House on the day when it is to be moved. Tuesday evening sittings are appointed for the consideration of notices of motion before the bills set down for that day are considered, and the order in which these notices stand is determined by a ballot.

**OATHS OF MEMBERS.** New Members may take and subscribe the oath at any time during the sitting of the House before the orders of the day and notices of motion have been entered upon, or after they have been disposed of, but no debate nor business may be interrupted for that purpose.

**OCCUPATION FRANCHISE.** [See Borough Voters and County Voters.]

**ORDER.** [See Forms of Procedure.]

**ORDERS OF THE DAY, THE,** are the bills set down for consideration on a particular day. [See "Government Orders."]

**PARLIAMENT** is the name of the supreme legislature of Great Britain. It was first used in the reign of Henry III.

**PARLIAMENTARY AGENT.** Is a Professional gentleman who acts as Solicitor in promoting private bills.

**PERSONS DISQUALIFIED TO SIT AS MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT.** Every Member of the House of Lords, the representative Peers of Ireland, all Scottish Peers, whether representative or otherwise, sheriffs and returning officers for the counties and places for which they act, Clergymen of the Established Church, Roman Catholic Priests, aliens, the holders of all Government offices created since the year 1705,

Government contractors, bankrupts, and persons attainted of treason or felony. [See also "Acceptance of Office."]

**PETITIONS.** Every subject in this Country has the right of petitioning the Sovereign, or either House of Parliament, for the redress of grievances. Petitions to Parliament must, however, be drawn up according to prescribed rules; e.g., those to the House of Lords must be addressed, *To the Right Honourable the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament Assembled*; and those to the House of Commons must be directed, *To the Honourable the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland in Parliament assembled, or To the Honourable the Commons of the United Kingdom in Parliament Assembled*. Electors commence their petition as, *The Humble Petition of the Electors of the Parish of —, sheweth that, &c., and a private individual must set forth his name and occupation thus,—The Humble Petition of Thomas Charles Burd, coal merchant, sheweth, that, &c.* Following this must be mentioned the grievance for which relief is desired, and the whole must conclude with a specific prayer, as, *Wherefore your Petitioners humbly pray that your Honourable House will be pleased to, &c.* Here must follow particulars of the special relief that is asked for, the concluding sentence being, *And your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray.* If the prayer be omitted the petition is useless, as the House will not attend to a mere statement of grievances. Immediately following the prayer must be written the signatures, one of which at least must be written on the same skin of parchment or sheet of paper as the petition. All signatures or marks must be original, procuration not being in any case allowed, except in cases of incapacity by sickness, for either a single individual or any body of persons, but the common seal of a corporation is acknowledged as a petition of the whole corporate body. Every petition must be written upon paper or parchment, be free from erasures or interlineation, and written in the English language, or accompanied by a literal translation, which the member presenting it certifies to be correct; but no letters, affidavits, or other documents will be received. Every petition is rejected unless it be indited in temperate language and be free from any imputation upon the character or conduct of either Houses of Parliament, the Courts of Justice, or other constituted authorities. Reference is not allowed to be made to any debates, or to motions that it is supposed will be made, while petitions praying for a grant of public money, or charge upon the revenues of India, or for the remission of taxes or

dues, are not received except on the recommendation of the Crown. Every member presenting a petition must affix his name at the beginning thereof, and is presumed to know that the standing regulations respecting petitions have been complied with. No debate is allowed when petitions are laid upon the table, and they stand referred to the Committee on Public Petitions, without any question being put; but if the petition relate to a subject with respect to which the member presenting it has given notice of a motion, and the said petition has not been ordered to be printed by the committee, such member may, after notice given, move that such petition be printed with the votes. Petitions under two pounds in weight may be forwarded by post, free of charge, to any member of either House, in parcels open at each end, and marked outside "Parliamentary Petitions."

**PETITIONS, ELECTION.** [See Election Petitions.]

**POLLING.** [See Election of Members.]

**POOR LAW BOARD.** This consists of several high Officers of State, but is practically managed by a President and Vice-President, who have the control of the work-houses and the guardians of the poor. It annually submits to Parliament a general report of its proceedings.

**POSTMASTER-GENERAL, THE.** Is a high Officer of State appointed by patent. He makes contracts for the conveyance of the public mails, and sees that they are properly executed. He also receives the moneys arising from the postage of letters, pays the expenses, keeps the accounts of the office, and superintends the whole department.

**POT-WALLOPERS.** A term applied to voters in certain boroughs where all who boil (wallop) a pot are entitled to vote. *Encyc. Am.*

**PREMIER, THE.** Is the Head of Her Majesty's Government, and it is at his immediate recommendation that his colleagues are appointed, and he, with scarcely any exception, dispenses the patronage of the Crown. His official position is that of First Lord of the Treasury.

**PREVIOUS QUESTION, THE.** Is a mode of attempting to avoid a direct expression of opinion upon a motion. It is effected by proposing, in lieu of the original motion, a motion "that that question be now put." A vote is taken on this, and if negative the original motion cannot be put to the vote during that sitting.



**PRIVATE BILLS.** Are those introduced by companies or individuals for the purpose of enabling them to undertake works of utility at their own risk, and for their own benefit, or for procuring naturalization, change of name, &c. Private bills are brought in upon petitions signed by the suitors or their agents. The fees payable for promoting or opposing a private bill are set forth in the "Standing Orders" which are published annually. [See Bills, Public.]

**PRIVILEGES OF MEMBERS.** Every Member is entitled to freedom of speech, and is exempt from serving on juries, and can introduce one person daily to the Strangers' Gallery.

**PROCEDURE.** [See forms of Procedure.]

**PROPERTY QUALIFICATION OF MEMBERS** was abolished in 1856.

**PROPERTY FRANCHISE.** [See County Voters.]

**PROROGATION OF PARLIAMENT.** Is an interruption of its sitting by Royal authority, and the Crown may, notwithstanding the prorogation, summon it for the dispatch of business, by giving fourteen days' notice. Every bill and other proceeding, save impeachments, must be renewed *de novo* after a prorogation. By an act passed in the year 1867, the Crown may prorogue Parliament by proclamation only, and without any subsequent writ or commission, but the act does not apply to prorogation at the close of a session.

**PUBLIC BILLS:** [See Bills, Public.]

**QUESTION, A.** Is a motion moved and seconded, and put by the Speaker to the House as a question for their decision.

**QUESTION OF PRIVILEGE, A.** May be brought before the House without notice, and takes precedence of motions and orders of the day.

**REGISTRATION OF VOTERS.** Overseers' notices must be served in counties and boroughs on or before the 20th June. Notices of claims on or before July 20th in counties, and Aug. 25th in boroughs. Lists are made up in counties on the 31st July, and notices of objection must be served on or before Aug. 20th in counties, and Aug. 25th in boroughs. Courts of Revision are held in Counties between Sept. 20th and Oct. 31st, and in boroughs between Sept. 15th and Oct. 3<sup>rd</sup>.

**RESIGNATION OF SEAT.** This can only be effected by accepting an office of emolument under the Crown. [See Vacating Seats.]

**REPORTING.** A gallery is set apart for the exclusive use of newspaper reporters. It is, however, contrary to the Standing orders of the House that strangers should be present, and any member can demand that the order be enforced. It is a privilege, however, that has fallen into complete desuetude, but the publication of debates is nevertheless theoretically a breach of privilege.

**RETURNING OFFICER'S EXPENSES.** The expenses of the returning officer are to be paid by the candidates (or persons proposing a candidate without his consent) in equal proportions. The expenses allowed by the statute are—Booths at each polling-place in a county, not to exceed 40*l.*; booths for each district of a borough, not to exceed 25*l.*; deputies of returning officer, each per day 2*l.* 2*s.*; poll-clerks per day 1*l.* 1*s.*

**REVISING BARRISTER.** Is an officer appointed annually for the purpose of revising the registered list of voters.

**ROYAL ASSENT, THE.** The act by which the bills that have passed the Houses of Parliament become law, and without which they are null. It constitutes one of the highest prerogatives of the Crown. It is a *bonâ fide* exercise of legislative function, though there has not been an instance of its being withheld since the year 1707. The Royal Assent is either given by the Sovereign in person, or by Commissioners appointed for that special purpose and for that single occasion. The Commissioners are usually three or four of the High Officers of State. As soon as the Royal Assent has been given, what was before a bill immediately becomes an Act, having the effect and force of law.

**SCOT AND LOT.** Parish payments. When persons were taxed not to the same amount, but according to their ability, they were said to pay "scot and lot."

**SELECTION, THE COMMITTEE OF,** arranges the sitting and classifies the business of private-bill committees.

**SENIOR MEMBER, THE.** Is the member returned at the head of the poll, not the member who has served the constituency the longest time.

**SERGEANT-AT-ARMS, THE.** Is an officer appointed by patent under the Great Seal, attached to the House, who is styled "the Serjeant-at-Arms attending the Speaker of the House of Commons." He is assisted by a deputy and several subordinates. During the sitting of the House he occupies a chair below the bar, and to him is delegated the maintenance of order in the approaches to the House and the adjoining offices. His duties are performed under the directions of the House, communicated to him by the Speaker. He apprehends and retains in custody all persons committed by order of the House.

**SESSION.** The Session of Parliament continues from the time of its meeting until it is either prorogued or dissolved. The House of Commons limits to one year the duration of the Mutiny Act and votes the supplies for the public service only by grants for the current year. The Crown is therefore compelled to resort to an annual assemblage of Parliament, which usually takes place early in February. Fourteen days at least, but generally thirty or forty days, previous to the intended meeting, a proclamation is issued by the Crown, commanding the attendance of the Lords and Commons, usually at Westminster, but it may be at any place within the United Kingdom. The progress which a measure makes in one Session does not influence its position in the next, as, if not completed previous to the prorogation of Parliament, it must be commenced *de novo*. The business usually transacted on the first day of every Session is to consider the Speech from the Throne. One Bill, however, always receives a first reading, in order to assert the right of Parliament to consider the interests of the people before considering the subjects contained in the Royal Speech. The usual duration of the Session is from February till August; but no number or length of adjournments destroys its continuity.

**SESSIONAL ORDERS** are agreed to at the commencement of each session, and are not intended to continue beyond that period.

**SOIT FAIT COMME IL EST DESIRE.** The words in which the Royal Assent is given to Private Bills.

**SOLICITOR-GENERAL.** Is an officer of the Crown who ranks next to the Attorney-General, with whom he is associated in conducting the legal business of the Crown.

**SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.** Is the representative of its powers, proceedings, and dignity. His chief duties are to present to the Sovereign addresses from

the Commons; to manage in the name of the House, when counsel, witnesses, or prisoners are at the bar; to reprimand persons who have incurred the displeasure of the House; to issue warrants of committal for breaches of privilege; to communicate in writing with any parties, when so instructed by the House; to exercise a general control over the business of the House, both public and private; to express the thanks or approbation of the Commons to distinguished personages; to control and regulate the subordinate officers of the House; to adjourn the House if forty members are not present, and to appoint Tellers on division. He does not speak on debates, except on committees of the whole House, and does not vote except to give a casting vote when the numbers are equal. He is elected at the commencement of each Parliament, and holds office until a dissolution. He gives state dinners to as many of the House as he can entertain, between the commencement of the Session and the Easter holidays. He receives a salary of £5,000 a year, and has a furnished residence; is a member of the Privy Council, and ranks next after Barons. It is customary for the Speaker, on retiring from office, to be created a peer, and to receive a pension of £2,000 a year, for two lives. When incapacitated from attending to his duties his place is occupied by the Chairman of Ways and Means. In adjusting the proceedings and in preserving order, the Speaker issues his own directions and commands, but they are in reality those of the House. He is said to have "nither eye to see, nor tongue to speak in the House, but as the House, whose servant he is, is pleased to direct him." He is the great depository of the precedents which have been established in former Parliaments, and, armed with these, he is prepared to state what the House, in the natural order of things, will require to be done. In the enforcement of his authority, he looks to the support of the House; and if on any point a majority of those present should be against him, his own personal voice would be ineffective. In practice, however, such discussions never arise, and as no man is ever chosen Speaker who is not endowed with temper, firmness, and a knowledge of the practice of the House, the Speaker's directions are taken as law.

**SPEAKER'S GALLERY.** Strangers are admitted to the Speaker's Gallery on the personal application of a member. It is customary for the visitor's name to be inscribed some days previously in a book provided for that purpose by the Serjeant-at-Arms. There are two lists supplied daily to the doorkeeper; one being termed "supplementary," and the persons whose names appear on this have to give precedence to

those whose names are on the first list. This Gallery is immediately below that of the "Strangers'."

**STANDING ORDERS,** are for the permanent guidance and order of proceedings. They have been agreed to at various times, and if not repealed endure in force from one Parliament to another. One of these orders has been in force since March 29th, 1707.

**STRANGERS, ADMISSION OF.** Strangers are not allowed to enter any part of the House appropriated to members, but are admitted to the gallery by producing a written order from a member.

**SUCCESSIVE OCCUPATION.** Different premises may be occupied in the same borough or county, providing all other requisitions are complied with.

**SUPPLY, COMMITTEE OF.** A Committee of the whole House, and to it is delegated the power of agreeing to or repudiating the Government resolutions for granting to the Crown the sums necessary for conducting the various branches of the public service. Those that are agreed to are reported to the House, and are either adopted or rejected; if agreed to, the Lords of the Treasury at once issue the funds ordered by the House. At the end of each session the supply resolutions are consolidated in the "Appropriation Bill," which, after it has passed the House of Lords, is carried by the Speaker to the bar of the Upper House to receive the Royal assent.

**TELLER.** Is a member appointed by the Speaker when a division takes place to count the number of members voting for or against a motion. Two are appointed for each side.

**"THAT I DO NOW LEAVE THE CHAIR."** Is the question put by the Speaker prior to the whole House going into Committee.

**"THAT THE ORDERS OF THE DAY BE NOW READ,"** That the House proceed to further business without a decision taking place on the motion then under discussion.

**"THAT THIS BILL BE COMMITTED."** The question that is put to the House immediately after the second reading, and which is rarely opposed.

**"THAT THIS BILL DO PASS."** The question that is put to the House after a bill has been read a third time.

**"THIS DAY SIX (OR THREE) MONTHS."** The motion that a bill be read a second time upon this day six months is the ordinary mode of moving its rejection.

**TIME OF MEETING.** The House meets at a quarter before four o'clock [for exceptions see Morning Sittings], when the Chaplain reads prayers. The Speaker, then seated at the Clerk's table, counts the House, and if forty members be present at four o'clock, the galleries are opened, and the business of each sitting is conducted according to the following routine:—From four till half-past is devoted to the consideration of private bills and the reception of public petitions; at half-past four notices of motions on future days are given, and a ballot taken to settle the precedence of those motions, and unopposed motions for returns are moved; this over, questions are asked of members of the Government respecting matters of a public nature, and then the regular business of the sitting is commenced, namely, the consideration of the orders or motions set down for that day.

**TRADE BILLS.** [See Bills.]

**UNDER SECRETARIES OF STATE.** Two of these are attached to the office of each Secretary of State, one being usually permanent, and the other dependent upon the administration in power.

**UNDETERMINED ORDERS ON RESOLUTIONS.** [See "Forms of Procedure."]

**UNION, THE,** denotes the act by which the two separate Kingdoms of England and Scotland were incorporated into one under the title of the Kingdom of Great Britain. The first Parliament subsequent to the Union met Oct. 23rd, 1707. The Union of Great Britain and Ireland took place in 1800.

**VACATING SEATS.** By accepting an office of emolument from the Crown, a member at once vacates his seat. It is customary for a member who wishes to resign to apply for the sinecure Stewardship of Her Majesty's Chiltern Hundreds; the Stewardship of the Manors of East Hendred, Northstead, or Hempolme; or for the Escheatorship of Munster.

**WAR, THE SECRETARY OF STATE FOR,** has the general control and direction of the army, in which he is assisted by the Commander-in-Chief.



**VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, THE,** are the entries printed and published daily of the transactions of the House made at the table by the clerks, from which the journals are compiled.

**WAYS AND MEANS, COMMITTEE OF.** A committee of the whole House, which regulates the issue of public money, to meet the grants voted in the Committee of Supply, and sanctions the imposition of the taxes necessary for the service of the current year. The votes of the Commons affecting the imposition of taxes take immediate effect in anticipation of the statutes necessary to make those votes a law. The Lords have the power to reject

any bill that passes through their House; but the exercise of this power as regards a bill touching taxation "is justly regarded by this House with peculiar jealousy," as was resolved by the Commons, July, 1860, after rejection of the Paper Tax Repeal Bill by the Lords in that year.

**WEDNESDAY SITTING.** The House meets every Wednesday at twelve o'clock. Wednesday is set apart to the bills brought in by private Members, and, unless previously adjourned, continues to sit until six o'clock p.m., when the Speaker adjourns the House without putting any question, and the business under discussion, or business undisposed of, stands as orders of the day for the next sitting of the House.

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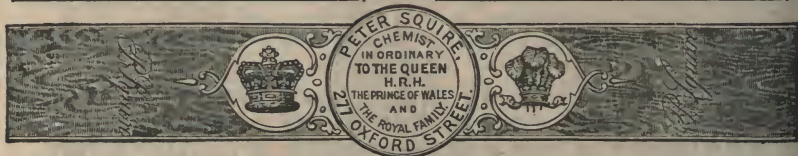
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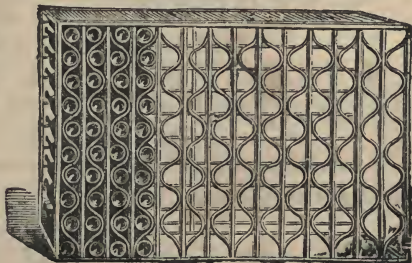
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
