IIS THAT GIT! SEIZE AND RUN GEAMfSL LINE Municipal Ownership League Declares Road Has Been Abandoned, CONDUIT SYSTEM ASKED Resolutions Call for Immediate Action by the Proper Authorities. The Municipal Ownership League of Ban Francisco passed resolutions yesterday calling upon the authorities Immediately to take possession of the Oeary-street railway and to operate it for the people. The league advised the immediate reconstruction of the road Into a conduit electric system. The resolution is as follows: Whereas, The Geary Street Railway Company has abandoned the operation of the railway on Cleary street, owned by the city, and refuses to accommodate the people with street railway service, although It has been permitted to use this street without any franchise since 1903, and Whereas, The receipts of the company during 1905 were \$162,616, of which (ItO.000 was profit; and since the fire the receipts, according to the reports of that company to the Supervisors, have Increased to \$294,702 a year, with an additional expense of less than \$10,000, thus yielding the company n additional profit ot \$124,176, or a total profit during the year 190b. of \$212,176.
