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Description

This data collection contains individual declarations of passengers arriving at various Canadian ports between 1919 and 1924. The declarations were a standard pre-printed form called Form 30A. This form was in official use between June 1, 1921 and December 31, 1924 and was regulated by the Department of Immigration and Colonization. A form was to be completed for each passenger, including children. Exceptions were for passengers in transit to the U.S. The forms were then submitted to immigration officers upon arrival at the port of destination. [Learn more...](#)

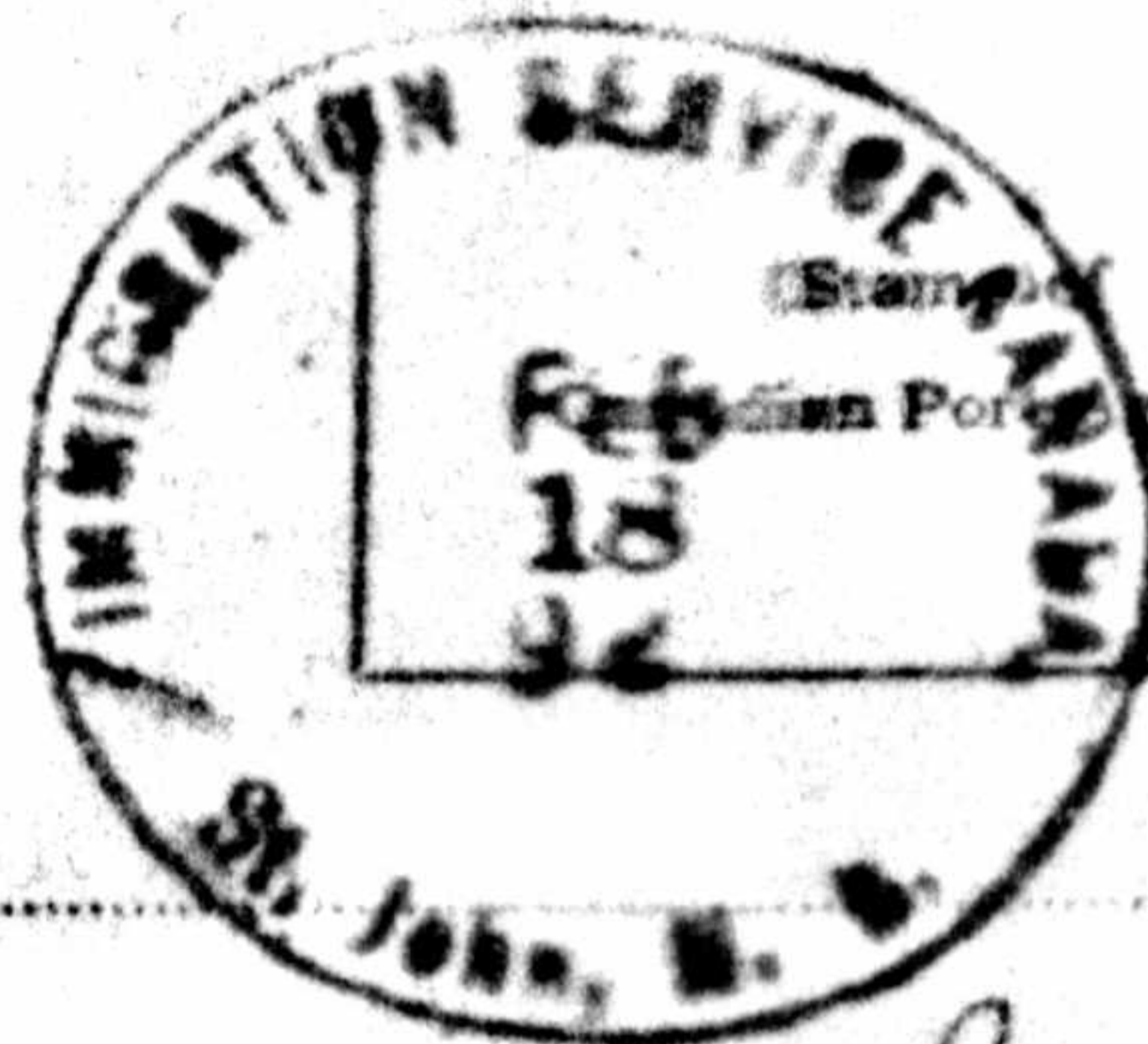

**SIR JAMES H. SIMPSON
WILL COME TO COAST**

**Another Knight and Forty
American Tourists Among
the Arrivals**

QUEBEC, Aug. 27.—The Canadian Pacific 17,000-ton steamer Montclair from Liverpool, in command of Captain R. G. Lalla, arrived at Quebec yesterday morning at 5 o'clock with 864 passengers, including returned Canadians, prominent Americans and well-known Britons.

Among the 65 cabin passengers, 22 of whom landed at Quebec to continue their journey by rail, were Sir James Hope Simpson, general manager of the Bank of Liverpool and Martins, with Lady Simpson; Sir E. A. Ridsdale and Lady Ridsdale of London, H. Hansen, nephew of Dr. Nansen, the Arctic explorer; F. Christensen, Norway; Major J. B. Johnson of the Canadian government intelligence service, Ottawa; Dr. and Mrs. Martin of Vancouver, B. C.; E. V. Omeara Stirling, editor of the Ottawa Journal, who went to Ireland in connection with the Irish Olympic games; Dr. C. M. Carter of Los Angeles, Calif., and a party of 46 American tourists; Miss F. Wilbrow of Toronto and party, Miss H. J. Camp, niece of Sir Norman Hill; Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Cole of Temple tours; Mr. Quilla and family, Toronto, manager of Dominion Textile Company.

SIMPSON ON EUROPE

Sir James Hope Simpson said he had come to Canada with Lady Simpson for the benefit of his health. He had put aside all his banking activities and had now only one thought until he returned to Liverpool — a pleasant tour through Canada and a good rest, with the object of recuperating his strength.

Sir James was rather reluctant to give an interview on European political questions. During the war he did good work for the British government in regard to financial questions as well as making a special mission to Norway. He said the reparation question would have to be settled and the sooner the better for Europe. He said until the Allied governments get together and agree upon some scheme of settlement the German mark will continue to depreciate and eventually bring about a serious financial crisis in Europe that is likely to have more serious consequences which will involve the entire world.

COMING WEST

"I have a strong friendship for Canada," said Sir James, "and I intend after leaving Montreal to make a trip to the Rockies and the Pacific Coast, returning back east, and I will spend some time in the province of Quebec.

The third class passengers to the number of 329 were landed for immigration inspection and at nine o'clock the Montclair left for Montreal.

A case of sudden death was discovered a little before seven o'clock this morning when one of the steamer's stewards went to call a third class passenger named Robert Jones, aged about 50 years, a returned Canadian, who resided at 58 Division Street, St. Catharines, Ont., and found him dead. It is presumed that he must have died from heart disease during the night.
