P. Whitwell Wilson, Former British Parliament Member, to Speak at Church Sunday

**'The Claim of the World'
Will Be Topic at
Union Service**

P. Whitwell Wilson, former member of the British Parliament and for 21 years a newspaperman, will be the speaker at the West Side union service of the West Presbyterian and Tabernacle Methodist churches Sunday night at the Tabernacle church. Mr. Wilson will talk on "The Claim of the World." The Rev. Lloyd Stanton Ruland, pastor of West church, will assist in the service.

Mr. Wilson is well known in America as the author of numerous biographies and as a magazine writer and lecturer on international affairs. He has lived on both sides of the Atlantic. For many years in intimate contact with statesmen of the highest influence in Britain, he has since 1917 made his home in the United States.

Mr. Wilson was born in Kendal, England. He was awarded scholarships to Claire College, Cambridge; in his second year was elected president of the Cambridge Union society, famous for its debates; took honors in mathematics; and received an M. A. degree. Joining the staff of the London Daily News, he continued with the paper 21 years.

At the age of 30, he entered Parliament. In his maiden speech he introduced the Right to Work Bill, seconded by James Ramsey MacDonald; and later the first Housing and Town Planning resolution.

In 1917 Mr. Wilson came to New York to represent the Daily News and on a mission of Anglo-American understanding. He is now a special contributor to the New York Times, where his interpretation of foreign affairs and the economic situation and his reviews of books have attracted wide attention. His articles also appear in Current History, Review of Reviews, North American Review and other periodicals. He is on the permanent staff of the Encyclopedia Britannica.

Among his biographies "The Life of William Pitt the Younger" has been a best seller, and was chosen by Doubleday-Doran for its book club.

For 14 years Mr. Wilson has been widely known in the United States and Canada as a lecturer. He also has delivered commencement addresses at many schools and colleges. Although a layman he filled the pulpit of the Rev. S. Parkes Cadman in Brooklyn and has preached in scores of other churches.

The service at the Tabernacle church Sunday night will open at 7:30 o'clock. The Rev. John W. Flynn, pastor, will be in charge.

City Library Employees to Be Insured

**Decision Reached After
Compensation Award
to Janitor**

Compensation insurance covering all employees of the Public Library was planned today by city officials.

The proposal was discussed recently with the finance committee of City Council by Frank Czak, treasurer of the library board, after Lewis L. Aldrich, a library janitor, was awarded a claim of \$416.14 in compensation court.

In a letter to City Manager C. A. Harrell, the library board treasurer pointed out that compensation insurance covering all library employees could be obtained at a yearly premium of \$104.08.

An ordinance will be introduced in City Council Monday afternoon calling for transfers from the budget contingency fund to pay the award to Mr. Aldrich and meet the insurance premium.
