

- 19 **DOUGLAS GABRIEL:** Welcome to the American Intelligence
- 20 Media, the home of the Anonymous Patriots. I am your host,
- 21 Douglas Gabriel. Today we have with us one of our favorite
- 22 friends. He is the founder and CEO of Leader Technologies, and
- 23 he has been working with us in so many areas. It's so exciting
- 24 to have him here today. I just want to reach out and thank you

- 1 for making the effort to come up here to the studios for us,
- 2 Michael McKibben.
- 3 MICHAEL MCKIBBEN: Great to be here, thank you.
- 4 GABRIEL: People who know us know that we've already done a
- 5 number of videos with Michael, and some very amazing audios. I
- 6 guess some people are responding to some of the ones that we
- 7 recently did. Somehow Michael corners me and asks me questions.
- 8 He reverses the table. I don't know why he gets away with that,
- 9 but I think Betsy's in on it. I think there's a conspiracy, to
- 10 be quite frank with you. But, Michael is here today because we
- 11 are going to talk about the thing that everybody keeps saying:
- 12 Okay, we know your story, and I am going to tell it in a very
- 13 quick nutshell in a second. But, what can we do? What can we do
- 14 to help? You've been saying it all along, but it kind of goes
- 15 over people's head because it's such a bizarrely simple solution
- 16 to so many, many big problems.
- Not only the problems with them stealing your intellectual
- 18 property, you can give the exact right terms, but the ideas that
- 19 you discovered that then became the capacity for the Internet to
- 20 be scalable. So, that opens up all the different Silicon Valley
- 21 industries that took advantage of, basically stealing your
- 22 patent, more or less as the way that I would put it in simple
- 23 terms, so we're going to talk about that.

- 1 Because, you have come up with a brilliant idea called The
- 2 Miller Act where, literally, Donald Trump could simply order
- 3 the Treasury Department to take a look at your bill that you're
- 4 presenting, and in so doing you could collapse the entire
- 5 monopoly of Silicon Valley Boy Kings. You could in fact
- 6 reconstitute the PsyOps [psychological operations] of Facebook,
- 7 of Google, of Gmail, of YouTube, all of them, completely,
- 8 because it all comes back to the theft of your technology by
- 9 IBM, through a group they called the IBM Eclipse Foundation.
- 10 When they say Eclipse it's because they eclipsed your
- 11 technology, and that's the saddest thing.
- 12 So we'll go into a little summary in a minute. Let's just
- 13 hear what can people do to help. That's what they want to hear.
- 14 They've been begging us [to know] how can they can help your
- 15 cause.
- 16 MCKIBBEN: In big picture terms, we have discovered that the
- 17 government has spent 17 years distributing our technology to the
- 18 entire tech world, including all the agencies, and has had free
- 19 use of our invention ever since it was discovered by them in the
- 20 year 2000.
- 21 GABRIEL: By government, you mean, not only IBM, government?
- 22 MCKIBBEN: The government itself.
- 23 GABRIEL: But, IBM is basically also an extension of the
- 24 government per se. Right?

- 1 MCKIBBEN: That's what we've discovered -- that the
- 2 technology base that the government was intending to use for The
- 3 Internet of Things was run by IBM, with help from Microsoft, and
- 4 Cisco, and all the others. It was intended to be a global
- 5 control system.
- 6 The solution that our shareholders came up with, I can't
- 7 take credit for [it, was this]. We looked at: How does the
- 8 government pay vendors when the vendors have not been paid? What
- 9 we discovered is that the government can't have liens put on it
- 10 like a contractor would if [the government] is not paying its
- 11 subcontractors. But the government passed a law called The
- 12 Miller Act. The Miller Act allows two tiers of unpaid
- 13 contractors to a government project to be paid by submitting a
- 14 notice called The Miller Act notice to the government agency
- 15 that benefited from the technology. And, as a result, put that
- 16 [Miller Act notice] forward as a claim to the government. And,
- 17 the government is then obliged to pay it, if the government has
- 18 benefited from that technology, whether there was a contract or
- 19 not. That's what most people don't realize. Everybody tries to
- 20 play this game that, oh well, you didn't have an official
- 21 contract, you didn't have signatures. No, that's not the rule.
- 22 The rule is if benefit has been received by the beneficial
- 23 party, then they are obliged to pay the people that they receive
- 24 the benefit from. And that's us.

- 1 This is an unprecedented situation. So, you talked about
- 2 some of the results of what this could do. We're not out to
- 3 change anybody else's business. Now, that may happen, but we're
- 4 not out to change their business. We're out to protect our
- 5 interests in our business. So, that's why we put The Miller Act
- 6 forward. We discovered a...
- 7 GABRIEL: Win-Win-Win scenario.
- 8 MCKIBBEN: We discovered that the government itself was the
- 9 party who stole our technology. There's never been a situation
- 10 like this where the executive branch of the government stole
- 11 somebody's invention, distributed it out to the whole planet,
- 12 and then has allowed their fascist corporate partners, plus all
- 13 the government, to benefit from that technology without paying
- 14 for it. It's never happened before. So, we were looking at an
- 15 unprecedented situation.
- Our shareholders, in brainstorming sessions, asked how can
- 17 we (a) get paid, and (b) what we can do to help fix the problems
- 18 that this created.
- 19 Well, one of the big problems that this situation created
- 20 is complete control of the Free Press. What we now see, and I
- 21 think it's pretty common knowledge, the Free Press is totally
- 22 controlled by this cabal of people who stole our invention.
- 23 So, what we've said is, Mr. President, please pay us for 17
- 24 years of free use, license our technology going forward, and

- 1 what we are willing to do is take the cash that is going to be
- 2 paid to us and put that back into developing a truly Free Press
- 3 to hold the powerful accountable.
- 4 GABRIEL: This is so topical. It's so important now because
- 5 everywhere you look you can see that Facebook is being attacked
- 6 because they admit that they are a PsyOps [Psychological
- 7 Operations] program that was weaponized by the United States
- 8 government. That has, in fact, been subsidized by the NSA, and
- 9 that in fact, they don't really sell that many ads. It's a
- 10 complete fake. Why did the United States government use
- 11 Facebook, Google, YouTube, Instagram, and these other groups.
- 12 That just suddenly, magically appeared as soon as Leader
- 13 Technologies took the step that was really, in a novices mind
- 14 like mine, was the quantum leap for scalability to be able to go
- 15 global with the Internet. They could do it on a small scale, in
- 16 my understanding, but it couldn't be done on a large scale. And
- 17 so, you're a revolutionary discovery needs to simply be paid
- 18 for.
- 19 Now, can Trump do that? Of course you can do that. Anybody
- 20 can turn in a bill to the United States government, and say, I
- 21 rendered these services to you, and so you owe me this. And they
- 22 should look and say, Well, okay, yeah, I guess you did. [For
- 23 example] Look, you built that bridge for us. That can be done
- 24 after the fact, no contract, exactly, as you've described.

- 1 But, it's the Win-Win-Win scenario that makes me so
- 2 excited. Because, this could be as simple as the following. We
- 3 already see from his [President Trump's] December 22, 2017
- 4 executive order, that Trump seems to be using the Treasury and
- 5 U.S. Marshals to go beyond the Department of Justice and the
- 6 FBI, just get straight to business.
- 7 So, he could again use the Treasury. Use the Intelligence
- 8 Agency, the Office of Intelligence and Analysis for the
- 9 Treasury, take a look at your bill and say, well you know what?
- 10 Not only do we need to pay this company [Leader Technologies],
- 11 but we also need to take down the monopolies that have arisen
- 12 out of this, which are, in fact, a terrorist economic national
- 13 security threat. That's all he has to do, he has to recognize it
- 14 for what it is, and that is what it is.
- 15 If you don't recognize Jeff Bezos as an attack on American
- 16 retail, if you don't understand that Facebook was a C.I.A.
- 17 PsyOps, then you're just not reading the news. Because, they're
- 18 all admitting it. Their top CEOs, as you full well, know, have
- 19 come out and admitted these things. They say, "we don't let our
- 20 children anywhere near it." Because why? It was turned into a
- 21 weaponized forum of what your company [Leader Technologies] had
- 22 developed to give out free information.
- 23 Think about it. We could go back to the original idea of
- 24 your patents, or copyrights, your intellectual property, and say

- 1 this was the idea, we're paying you for, whether it's through
- 2 certification, or whatever, the people who [stole it will] then
- 3 really will be paying that the ones who stole it from you.
- 4 Those companies probably will fold, and someone will need
- 5 to take it over. They will have to be dismantled because they
- 6 have all the backdoors in them. They have all the spyware in
- 7 them. They have the commercialization that sells your "Black
- 8 Profile" to everyone.
- 9 So, what you're saying is that in one fell swoop, Donald
- 10 Trump could simply pay your bill, and it is [then] possible that
- 11 this could take down the criminality of the Patent Office. It
- 12 would take down Silicon Valley's fake military-supported digital
- 13 warfare weaponized companies that were really built... without
- 14 your technology they could not have done what has come to be.
- 15 They went the wrong direction with it. So, in one fell
- 16 swoop you're saying, what you say is that The Miller Act notice,
- 17 very humbly, could, in fact, change our entire economy, the
- 18 entire world economy, in fact, and could put it back into where
- 19 it was supposed to be -- that information is supposed to be free
- 20 to give people freedom. It's supposed to give them liberty. It's
- 21 supposed to empower them, instead of information being used to
- 22 weaponize against them.
- So, I salute The Miller Act proposal that you have.

- 1 MCKIBBEN: Thank you, and take that compliment on behalf of
- 2 the shareholders who helped develop it. But, this is like
- 3 ripples in a pond. What we discovered is that this Miller Act
- 4 notice was a very legal claim that we can make to the branch of
- 5 the government that caused this theft to occur.
- 6 What we recognized is that nobody had really ever dealt
- 7 with the kind of scale that we are talking about. So, at first
- 8 we started saying, Well, my gosh, we're talking about many
- 9 trillions of dollars, because we've never been paid and
- 10 everybody's had the benefit of it. Every cell phone has got
- 11 something like 28 or 30 [social] apps that people use every day.
- 12 Every one of those apps is infringing our patent. So, we looked
- 13 at it in terms of, okay, what are we owed as a technical
- 14 reality? And the number was huge. So, what we said was, let's
- 15 break this up, and put it into two pieces. One, a \$40 billion-
- 16 dollar piece for the history. Now that's way under what the
- 17 number should be. But, going forward, let's say, okay, we've got
- 18 a problem.
- 19 The whole market has a problem. Most people use these apps
- 20 every day -- what we invented. [They] don't pay anything, and
- 21 when you ask them, do you realize that you're using stolen
- 22 technology, they are shocked. They don't know. And when you say
- 23 that the person who, the company that, invented this was never
- 24 paid, they say, well, where do we pay? How much is it going to

- 1 cost us? We've come up with a number of two dollars per user per
- 2 month as an ongoing payment. That number works out to something
- 3 like 300 billion dollars a year for ongoing licenses. And then,
- 4 we started looking further and said, okay let's also give every
- 5 user of this technology a license for everything they're doing.
- 6 So, all of a sudden, everyone on the planet that's stolen our
- 7 technology, whether they knew it or not, then becomes legal,
- 8 including the thieves
- 9 **GABRIEL:** Is that like certifying them?
- 10 MCKIBBEN: It's a license. When you buy a piece of software,
- 11 you get a license with it, and that gives you a legal copy of
- 12 the license. None of that's been licensed [Leader's invention]
- 13 because the original thieves put out this meme, this propaganda,
- 14 that it [Leader's invention] was all open source. That was a
- 15 total fabrication.
- 16 It was never open source. When IBM first put it out through
- 17 The Eclipse Foundation, they actually took the header code off
- 18 of our code and actually put their copyright notice in it. I
- 19 mean, it's just unbelievably scandalous
- 20 GABRIEL: Your 17 years of legal battles with this cabal...
- 21 we like to list them, because it's the same group of criminals
- 22 in Washington, D.C. right now. You're talking about John
- 23 Podesta, Robert Mueller, Rod Rosenstein, Hillary Clinton, Bill
- 24 Clinton, James Chandler, Stephen Crocker, Michael Kappas ...

- 1 MCKIBBEN: David Kappos.
- 2 GABRIEL: David Kappos, Larry Summers, I forgot him last
- 3 time. How can I forget Larry Summers? These people have been
- 4 doing this for so long, since the early 90s, and unfortunately,
- 5 Michael and his company have been struggling with them for 17
- 6 years, not really knowing how powerful they were. These people
- 7 have come to light now ...
- 8 MCKIBBEN: We didn't have any of those names on our radar
- 9 screen. We just knew the courts were misbehaving. The courts
- 10 weren't following the law. We had the one person's name, James
- 11 Chandler
- 12 **GABRIEL:** Right, who seemed to be the kingpin and the
- 13 linchpin of the entire thing.
- 14 MCKIBBEN: Right?
- MCKIBBEN: Right. Yes, we thought, well, on paper he
- 16 [Chandler] was the expert in the country on trade secrets,
- 17 intellectual property, economic espionage, inventions, patents.
- 18 GABRIEL: He was on the National Security Council. He wrote
- 19 the laws. . . so he could break them.
- 20 MCKIBBEN: He wrote the Federal Trade Secrets Act, and
- 21 Economic Espionage Act of 1996.
- 22 GABRIEL: You sat with this man again and again, and he
- 23 basically stole your patent.

- 1 MCKIBBEN: In the Miller Act notice there's a picture of him
- 2 [Chandler] attending one of our product design meetings in early
- 3 2000. There he was learning about all of our technology, and how
- 4 we were going to approach scalability in the Internet.
- 5 Essentially, that is proof of the collaboration that occurred.
- 6 They took all that information, and while he was working with us
- 7 to file patents, they are taking the code [our social networking
- 8 invention] and distributed it to the whole planet.
- 9 So by the time we found out that this is what had happened,
- 10 the whole market had been established. I mean, if you look back
- 11 at the history of social networking, it really exploded in 2004,
- 12 after a conference that IBM Eclipse sponsored between on
- 13 February 2-5, 2004 in San Francisco called EclipseCon2004. That
- 14 was when the cabal pushed our code out to the whole market.
- 15 GABRIEL: Americans for Innovation has put together more
- 16 evidence than I've ever seen on any particular case. So for 17
- 17 years you've been working with your shareholders, with lawyers,
- 18 with patent lawyers, just fighting this battle against the same
- 19 group of people that, again and again, rear their ugly heads and
- 20 show themselves as insider traders who have become filthy rich
- 21 over, in fact, stealing patents like yours. But, yours [Leader's
- 22 invention] was one that became probably the largest impact in
- 23 our modern digital age.

- 1 GABRIEL: So, I love the idea of The Miller Act. It's a Win-
- 2 Win-Win scenario. I love the idea that if this could take place,
- 3 we could actually see, perhaps, the crumbling of this entire
- 4 edifice of the fake Silicon Valley.
- 5 So, the question that people have is, is there anything
- 6 else they can do? Do you need money to support legal concerns?
- 7 Or, I don't know, what is it that other people can do besides
- 8 get the word out_which has been amazing, by the way, with the
- 9 videos that we did together.
- 10 MCKIBBEN: They've been very helpful, thank you.
- 11 GABRIEL: They've spread far and wide. A lot of people have
- 12 been discussing this. But, is there anything else that people
- 13 can do for Leader Technologies. Could they approach your company
- 14 if they wish to support you?
- 15 MCKIBBEN: Let me focus my answer on the big picture need.
- 16 The big picture need is for everyone in the country who believes
- 17 that the rule of law should apply to the use of social
- 18 networking, all over the planet, should ask President Trump to
- 19 consider writing the check to Leader Technologies, to pay us for
- 20 the last 17 years. And, to license our technology going forward.
- 21 The President has the authority to fix this. So, the other
- 22 issue is how do you in Republic ... I think this is the other
- 23 aspect of [the theft of] our technology. It was used, basically,
- 24 to hide the misconduct of the powerful through social media,

- 1 through all these memes, all of the psychological warfare, all
- 2 of the propaganda that has been pushed out.
- I think the way we fix that [is by re-implementing] an idea
- 4 the Founders had for a truly for Free Press. The Free Press, in
- 5 theory, is supposed to hold the powerful accountable. But, as we
- 6 have seen, our mainstream media has been bought by these people.
- 7 So, they're nothing more than propaganda machines. What we need
- 8 to do is re-establish [a truly Free Press].
- 9 What we're willing to do is say, Mr. President, [when] you
- 10 get us paid, we're willing to start, is to use that cash to help
- 11 develop a truly Free Press through the alternative media_the
- 12 alternative media is just exploding right now, but it lacks
- 13 resources. So, what can happen in this one [Miller Act notice]
- 14 check that you write, we can then see hundreds of billions of
- 15 dollars a year in investment and cash going out to these
- 16 companies that helps develop a truly Free Press that is not
- 17 beholden to all of these power brokers that have taken over our
- 18 economy.
- 19 GABRIEL: So, your shareholders could be made right.
- MCKIBBEN: Yes.
- 21 **GABRIEL:** You could rectify the situation [regarding getting
- 22 social users legal with a blanket license].
- 23 MCKIBBEN: Yes.
- 24 GABRIEL: Everyone could actually make a ton of money.

- 1 MCKIBBEN: Yes.
- 2 GABRIEL: The criminals who have, in fact, stole this from
- 3 you could be held accountable. The Patent Office could be re-
- 4 established and the national emergency that Trump has declared
- 5 would actually be the platform upon which he could do this. And,
- 6 he could, in fact, just as you say, sign the check.
- 7 So, we have supported you from our angle in trying to get
- 8 the word out. And, we're doing everything we can to do exactly
- 9 what you asked to get the word straight up the line to the
- 10 President, to the people in Washington who have the power to act
- 11 and pay Leader Technologies what was stolen from them. So
- 12 Michael, thank you for being here again.
