NOMINATION OF KETANJI BROWN JACKSON

On Feb. 25, 2022, President Joe Biden <u>nominated</u> Ketanji Brown Jackson, a judge on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit, to succeed Justice Stephen Breyer upon his <u>retirement</u>. If confirmed by the Senate, Jackson would become the 116th justice of the Supreme Court and the first Black woman justice. Here is a collection of resources on Jackson's nomination.
